Academic Activities

Roll and Count

Nursery students participated in a fun activity called "Roll and Count Fun!" In this engaging exercise, they rolled dice and counted out the corresponding number of colourful pompoms.

Pattern Play

Senses Awakening (Recapitulation of Sensory Organ)

The identification of sense organ activities provided students with a comprehensive understanding of the five senses: sight, hearing, touch, taste, and smell. Through engaging, hands-on experiences, prep I students explored how each sense organ functions and contributes to their everyday lives.

Their enthusiasm was evident as they participated in various activities, allowing them to interact with the material in a fun way. By the end of the session, students had developed a deeper appreciation for the significance of each sense organ, making the experience not only enjoyable but also a valuable educational opportunity.

Drawing of Objects Related to Swar अ और आ

To reinforce the sounds of swar 와 and 왜 among prep I learners, an engaging activity was conducted where children drew pictures of objects related to these sounds. They were encouraged to use bright colours to make their drawings lively and fun.

Once everyone finished, a show-and-tell session was held, allowing each child to present their artwork and explain what it represented. This enjoyable activity helped them connect the sounds with the real world in a memorable way!











Learn to Count in Bundles

Counting skills are foundational for children's cognitive development and play a crucial role in their overall learning. To enhance this skill, an activity of Bundle counting with lollipops was conducted for Prep I students. As they counted and created bundles of lollipops, they not only practised their numbers but also gained a deeper understanding of quantities.

The hands-on nature of the activity made it enjoyable, and the students had a great time while learning. It was a fun-filled experience that effectively combined education with play!



Flashcards play a crucial role in preprimary education as they enhance memory retention and active recall, helping children remember key concepts. They also promote visual learning by associating words or images with meanings, supporting vocabulary development. To reinforce the concept of reading CVC words an activity was conducted for the students of prep II wherein they had to read the CVC word and match it with the corresponding picture flashcard.

Sense Organs

Sense organs play a vital role in how young children explore and understand the world around them. Our five sense organs—eyes, ears, nose, tongue, and skin—help us see, hear, smell, taste, and feel. For pre-primary children, these senses are essential for learning and development. To make them understand the importance of sense organs an activity was conducted for prep II students wherein they were associating the objects to the sense organs like perfume to nose, tambourine to ears and so on. The activity helped the children to become more aware of their environment, promoting a love for learning through exploration!











Drawing Pictures with Hindi Letters

Learning Hindi letters is a fun and creative journey! One engaging way to introduce letter recognition is by drawing pictures with Hindi letters. This activity combines art, imagination, and language skills to help children remember the shapes and sounds of Hindi letters. Prep II students had a blast learning the letters wherein they drew pictures associated with the different letters thereby enhancing their identification skills and vocabulary.
